Joining the organization in 1992, and serving as a member of the board of directors since 2001, she remains instrumental to its growth and expansion. Advancing Long Island's need for energy efficiency and green jobs and increasing the supply of affordable housing are recent issues for which she strives to gather support and accelerate effective change.

Garvin earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Sociology from Stony Brook University and a Master of Arts degree in Social Service Administration, Planning and Public Policy from the University of Chicago. Garvin completed the Senior Executives program at Harvard University in 2000; completed the Achieving Excellence in Community Development program at Harvard's Kennedy School in 2009; and is certified by the National Development Council as an Economic Development Finance Professional.

ECONOMIC CHARACTERISTICS

Pilot location: Village of Hempstead

- 27.6% without health insurance (2½ times higher than NYS)
- 20.5% below poverty level
- 13% unemployed
- 47% speak a language other than English at home
- 20% receive Supplemental Nutrition Assistance

OUTPUTS

- Improve 30 public housing units (weatherization, health & safety and aging in place)
- Improve 10 owner occupied houses
- Inspect 170 public housing units for health & safety and aging in place needs
- Collect baseline health data on 100 individuals
- Create linkages with healthcare providers

OUTCOMES

- Better health for very low income Village of Hempstead residents
